- I. Welcome/Introductions of Guest Administration T. Walter:
 - Dean Walter introduced Crystal Sanford-Brown, Interim Manager of Campus Affairs;
 Tammy Brown, Student Services Specialist in Counseling; Debi Ksionzek, Manager of Desktop Support.
- II. Announcements/Updates
 - A. Campus Conversations T. Walter reported:
 - Dean Walter explained that Campus Conversations is a gathering of 10 or less people with Dr. Roman that promotes communication. Participation is encouraged.
 - B. Diversity Training T. Walter reported:
 - The college is considering diversity training and is looking for feedback. The following questions need to be answered:
 - 1. Should we have diversity training?
 - 2. Should diversity training be mandated?
 - 3. How should diversity training be delivered (what format)?
 - The following comments/suggestions were made:
 - The Diversity Fair.
 - A cultural event where employees can share their cultural history.
 - How could this be made mandatory? Who would keep the records? Employees are inclined not to attend this type of event.
 - C. Title IX Training T. Walter reported:
 - Online Title IX training will soon be available and mandatory for employees and students. More information is forthcoming.

- D. Textbooks Update L. Moore reported:
 - Maria McCarthy, Manager of Auxiliary Services, recently gave a PowerPoint
 presentation to the Board of Trustees on the cost of textbooks and how OCC is trying to
 help students by reducing their financial obligation.
 - Lisa outlined the key points of the PowerPoint presentation.
 - Based on today's textbooks, the National Association of College Stores has determined the following breakdown:
 - ➤ 20.6% of every textbook sale goes to the college to cover operations and personnel cost
 - ➤ 2% covers freight cost
 - > 77.4% goes directly to the publisher
 - OCC currently uses the following criteria to help reduce costs:
 - Purchase from all sources
 - ➤ Books are competitively priced
 - ➤ Buyback is offered the week of final exams so students have the option to receive market value for their textbook
 - ➤ Buyback value is based on whether the book will be used the next semester; whether an access code is required; and the current inventory
 - ➤ Dynamic pricing we are competitive; transparent, returns are easy; we have what you need. Students can go online and find the price of a textbook by viewing multiple vendors and their prices.
 - > Financial aid can be used online
 - Rentals (approximately 250 titles)
 - > E-books
 - > Library resources
 - > Round-up for scholarships
 - How can OCC further reduce costs?
 - Faculty submit textbook and supply orders on time
 - Consider using the same book for the same course, campus and/or collegewide
 - > Consider having adjuncts use the same textbook as full-time faculty
 - > Faculty can collaborate with the publisher
 - > Faculty work with the campus store
- E. Student Life Update K. Pawlovich reported:
 - Voter registration took place last week. 43% of students between the ages of 18-24 are not registered to vote. There were 200 new voters registered college-wide. The Oakland County Clerk was also available to register students and answer questions.
 - Blood Drive 25 pints of blood were collected.
 - On March 2nd and 4th, Lakeland and Milford High Schools will have approximately 50 students on campus for a tour and information session. The same format will be used as in the past with the recruiters.
 - PJs for Patrick Suicide is the 2nd leading cause of death for 18-24 year olds. The bookstore is selling a pin for a minimum of \$2.00 to help raise awareness for depression

- and suicide prevention. The goal is to raise \$10,000 over the next 3 years for a scholarship to help students that deal with this struggle.
- Lunch with the President This event was rescheduled to March 21. Please encourage your students to attend.
- Swing Dance Friday, April 1 at 7:00 p.m. in the Student Center Arena. There will be a 20 piece jazz band under the direction of Orchard Ridge faculty Thomas Dennis. There will also be a dance troupe. Proceeds will benefit the Wounded Warrior Project. Volunteers are needed for this event.
