Time Line of Christian School Movement By J. S. Winston

1874	G.P. Bowser born in Maury County, Tennessee.
1897	Bowser, an A.M.E. preacher, is baptized into Gay Street Christian Church in Nashville, Tennessee.
1900	Bowser disassociates himself from Christian Church for what he believes are unscriptural practices. Marshall Keeble, S.W. Womack. Alexander Campbell, join him in this move. Group later becomes Jackson Street Church of Christ.
1902	Bowser begins publishing Christian Echo paper.
1907	Nashville, Tennessee-Jackson Street School opens. G. P. Bowser and S.W.Womack, teachers.
1909	Silver Point, Tennessee-Silver Point Christian Institute. Land purchased for \$250. 2 story building at cost of \$600. First called Putnam County Formal Industrial Orphan School. Staff: G.P.Bowser Lillie Gipson Alexine Page Adeline Brown Annie C. Tuggle
	T. H. Bushy (later taught music)

Salaries: Up to \$50 per month

Tuition: \$1.00 month Board: \$6.00 month

Students worked in Echo Printing office, did

yard work, helped with cooking and cleaning in order to pay for tuition and

board.

Courses: Three R's plus Bible, Latin, History

- Additional lots in Silver Point purchased for \$275 by A.M. Burton. Brick building erected for chapel. Wood frame four-room dormitory. Cost of materials was \$400.
- 1920 Silver Point School closes due to low enrollment and financial problems.
- A.M. Burton purchases 40 room Florence Crittendon
 Home building in Nashville, and donates
 it to Bowser for a school. Student
 preacher, R. N. Hogan joins him.
 Renames the school Southern Practical
 Institute.

Closes six weeks later after Bowser refuses to have black students enter through back door, as instructed by white Superintendent. Bowser moves to Louisville. Nashville blacks make down payment on what later becomes Nashville Christian Institute.

- 1920-32 Bowser begins publishing Christian Echo from Louisville, Kentucky in 1927. No formal school movement, although Bowser teaches in his home and in various churches.
- 1933 Bowser Christian Institute starts in Fort Smith,
 Arkansas in Bowser's home and is later housed in
 the Ninth Street Church of Christ. R.N. Hogan, J.S.
 Winston, G.E. Steward join school movement.
- 1946 Bowser Christian Institute closes with plans to reopen in Texas.

 Bowser, meanwhile, moves to Detroit.
- 1947 Bowser Christian Institute opens in Joseph Campau Church of Christ Educational Building in Detroit.
- 1948 Southern Bible Institute opens in Lake Como Church of Christ building in Fort Worth, Texas.
- 1949 Southwestern Christain College opens in Terrell, Texas
