Jack M. Hoover Appointed To MCC Board

At the recent annual Meetof the MCC Board of Directors held at the college, Jack N. Hoover of Dearborn, Michigan, was unanimously elected to the Board.

Chairman G. Wheeler Utley, in writing to brother Hoover, said, "Your interest in Christian education has been proven through the years. Your interest in MCC, in particular, has been shown by your great service to her. As we strive to make MCC a greater institution of good in every way, we know that we must begin by improving the Board, both by increased sacrifice from its members, and by addition of

outstanding personnel. We know the action of the Board in this instance has accomplished an upward step. We know that your experience, wisdom, and Christian stature will be invaluable to to the great work at MCC."

Brother Hoover confirmed his willingness to serve in a letter to Chairman Utley on November 10, 1965. Mr. Hoover is one of the best known and best loved members of the church in the Detroit area. His knowledge of the growth and development of the church in Michigan is extensive. He is a very active member of the Chase Road (Dearborn) congregation.

For many years, Mr. Hoover was



won over the hard-playing Baptist Bible College team of Grand Rapids December 4 by the close 85-82 margin.



MCC Salutes "Russia For Christ" Broadcast On 6th Anniversary

In November, 1959, the first gospel sermon was broadcast to the Soviet Union. It originated ed from a little concrete block building on the campus of MCC.

Stephan Bilak, a native Ukrainian, is now speaking five times each week to the Slavic world over stations in Monte Carlo and Inchon, S. Korea.

In addition, Brother Bilak has translated Monroe Hawley's correspondence Course and Batsell Baxter's tract, "what is the Church of Christ" into the Ukrainian language.

Broadcasts now originate in a well-equipped studion located in the new facilities of the Rochester church. "Russia For Christ"Broadcast has been under the oversight of the Rochester elders since April 1, 1965.
