On April 12, 1968, a Testimonial Dinner in honor of Marshall Keeble was held on the campus of Michigan Christian College. The delightful experience was the result of six months' planning, selection and rejection of dates, and considerable correspondence with those involved.

His contributions in various ways to the Keeble-Palmer Missionary Training Program have been invaluable. (1878 - 1968)

He preached again on Sunday afternoon, April 14, to a packed auditorium at the Taylor, Michigan church.

Engagements at the Belmont church in Dayton and at the Clifton congregation in Cincinnati took him into Ohio on Monday and Tuesday, April 15 and 16 in company with MCC Vice President Milton Fletcher and the writer. He thrilled capacity crowds there with his simple but moving presentation of the gospel of Jesus.

interest in people and in the things going on around him. For the three days he spent in the Detroit area he stayed in the home of Homer Black, one of "his boys", and discussed the church, the world situation and argued politices! The writer spent three unforgetable days as Keeble's "white valet" from Detroit to Dayton, to Cincinnati, and then on to Nashville. We discussed the war in Vietnam, talked baseball and even watched the Cubs and the Red Legs on our hotel television. He deplored the riotous situation in our cities and freely doled

out portions of his wonderful philosophy of life which is unmistakably Christian.

Brother Keeble grew old gracefully with Christ in his heart. He never lost his balance and value perspectives. He was continually thankful, never complaining. He kept his quaint good humor to the end and had his companions of these last days "in stitches" a good bit of the time. His gratitude for Christian friends such as David Lipscomb, T. B. Larimore, F. B. Shrygley and others of the pioneers was frequently expressed. His love for Lucien Palmer who took him to the Holy Land in 1960 and then

around the world in 1962 (when he was 84) was evident. To these and others he attributed whatever success he has been able to achieve.

So on Wednesday, April 17, 1968 Marshall Keeble came home to Nashville for the last time from a series of preaching appointments. Thousands had heard him and had been blessed by what he had said and by his very presence among them. He had returned from doing what he, many years before, had set his heart to do. May the Lord be praised that Marshall Keeble made his decision to preach the unsearchable riches of Christ Jesus!
