

Warriors Start Season Off With A Victory

After a successful season last year Michigan Christian College's basketball team is once again showing their strength. Although the season is yet young, the team is currently holding a 3-1 record.

Last year the Warriors finished the season with a 15-6 record which made them the North Central Christian Athletic Conference (NCCAC) champs. This year, they not only hope to equal last years success but are reaching out to new goals.

For the first time MCC is a member of the National Little College Athletic Association. The NLCAA is composed of colleges nationwide that have a student enrollment of less than 500. Seventy-five schools participate in the association and the top two teams of each post season district qualify for the national finals. MCC's goal is to make it to the national finals. Coach Doug Freeman feels that it is well within MCC's potential to qualify.

The Warrior's recent endeavors include a conference tournament which they won by outshooting Grand Rapids Baptist, 78-74, and Concordia, their toughest rival, 89-82. Allen Grant and Kenny Rider, both from Elkhart, Ind., were chosen first team, all tournament, for their outstanding performances.

In another game, overtime allowed the team to win over Washtenaw Community College, 98-88. The only loss incurred so far this season was at the hands of Highland Park Community College.

Michigan Christian's team consists of nine out-of-state players. Among them are Dave Rider, Kenny's brother, and Grant who have been averaging over twenty points per game. The Warriors also have Philip Foster from Georgia and Glenn Wilson from Massachusetts as key figures on the team. Eric Austin from Terre Haute, Ind., is considered by Freeman to be the best jumper on the team and John Highstreet from Algonac, Mi., will be starting for his third year.

Third annual phone-a-visit begins

Michigan Christian College is currently conducting its third annual phone-a-visit. The campaign began November 19 with an allnight prayer session. The session, which was divided into hourly devotionals, was organized by Rod Lehman from Plainwell, Mi., Beginning Friday at 10 p.m. and lasting throughout the night and early morning hours; an average of twenty-five students were present at all times, with several students participating the entire night. Various students led the individual devotionals, which covered a variety of topics relating to the phone-a-visit. Toward morning a devotional was held down by the lake and then as a grand finale a breakfast was held, at 7 a.m., for those who were active in the session.


The all-night prayer session and the pre-campaign meetings generated a great deal of enthusiasm among the students. For the first time college students were used as callers in the program.

The purpose of the phone-avisit is to raise money to pay for the faculty's salaries. This year Michigan Christian College is trying to enlist the aid of eleven hundred new families who might be willing to share their monthly income.

Chapel and student center near completion

The Westside Central Chapel and the Utley Student Center is nearing completion. Originally scheduled for this past fall, a delay was caused when the roofing company went on strike. The \$275,000 complex, which is connected to the Multi-purpose building, is now scheduled to be finished the winter of 1978.

Providing a TV-study area and a separate game area-lounge room, the Utley Student Center will be fully carpeted. The Student Body Association is raising the money for the furnishings, which will include couches, tables and various games. The student center is adjacent to the cafeteria, allowing students easy access to the snack bar. Sliding glass doors will form the rear of the center, permitting an excellent view of the lake.

The Westside Central Chapel will have a seating capacity of 420.

Appearing similar to a church building on the outside the chapel has a beamed wood roof and tinted glass windows along the front. Inside a stained glass window behind the platform will provide the focal point. The chapel is divided into three seating sections which, with the aid of sliding partitions can be converted into classrooms. Brown velour opera chairs that convert to desks will form the side tiered seating sections. The center section will consist of molded plastic stackable chairs.
