## New Skyline in the Works at RC



The new Ham Library, completed this fall, is a favorite study hall and meeting place for RC students. Soon an academic center will be added on to the library's east side.

The Rochester College campus is undergoing many changes these days, with the completion of the new Ham Library in August and a new academic building just around the corner. The library is 17,500 square feet in size and, in addition to holding the college's supply of books and reference materials, features several classrooms, conference and study centers, and a 30-terminal computer lab outfitted with a main DVD

player and all the latest in classroom software and technology. The academic building to come will be attached on the east side of the new library and will house many classrooms and faculty offices.

Several more projects are scheduled over the next few years in a construction campaign called "Catch the Vision." This campaign, which has been making things happen at RC since 1997, is also responsible for the building of the Ferndale/Hoggatt dormitory (1997), the Isom Atrium (2001), and the remodeling of the Westside-Central auditorium (2001). Upcoming additions include new parking lots, new athletic fields for baseball and soccer, another new dormitory, and an athletic complex complete with an indoor track, weight room, practice facilities, and gymnasium to seat 1500.

College students are very impressed with the campus improvements, especially the new library. "I think it provides the space and resources necessary for a good education, as well as adding a great deal of credibility to the college," said Student Body President Tim Parker.

The future is certainly looking big and bright at Rochester College... will you be a part of it?


## Athletic Teams

Rochester College offers ten intercollegiate sports teams that compete throughout the midwest in the United States






#### Spectrum
