Overseas program holds third summer in Scotland; Semester abroad to begin in Germany in Fall 2004

This year, Rochester College sent its third summer group overseas with the GEO (Global Educational Opportunities) program. This sixweek program, based in Aberdeen, Scotland, allows students to take six or nine credit hours of course work, while exploring not only Scotland, but England, Ireland, and Wales as well.

The success of the GEO program, as well as the success rates of study abroad programs at other colleges and universities worldwide, prompted the desire for Rochester College to host a semester long program as well. The GEO committee spent months researching and traveling throughout Europe to find the perfect location, and

the German capital of Munich.

A report from the committee cited the city's cosmopolitan culture, central European location and vast resources that could support special business and education programs as the factors that made Munich the clear choice over 28 other prospective European sites.

"Munich is a vibrant city, filled with all sorts of opportunities," said GEO chairperson Jennifer Hamilton. "There are museums, operas, theatres, historical sites and sports to take in. Munich is a travel hub, so even a two day weekend will provide opportunity to visit other cities in Europe." Popular travel choices will likely be Paris, Rome, Italy, Vienna, Prague, and Zurich.

PIC BREAKS GROUND ON NEW ACADEMIC BUILDING

On September 19, the RC faculty, staff, and student body, along with the Board of Trustees, the City of Rochester and Rochester Hills mayors, and other college supporters and community sponsors gathered next to the Ham Library to break ground for a new Academic Center. Despite gray skies and pending rain, the atmosphere was bright as yet another historic moment was written into RC history.

The Academic Center will be attached to the east side of the library, which itself has been open for only a year, and will house classrooms, labs, music facilities, a theatre, and a student center. It will be the fifth major addition to the Rochester College campus since 1997—and as some students believe, it may be the most important one yet.

"I guess it's hard to say that any one can be more necessary than the others," said senior Music major Colleen McVehil, referring to the dorm, atrium, parking lot, and library additions that preceded this structure, "but having an academic center with all the elements this one will have will be such a huge addition to the college."

Although the academic opportunities this facility will provide will be state-of-the-art, excitement on campus (at least within the student body) is largely directed toward the student center. With comfy couches, pool and bubble hockey tables, games, televisions with DVD players, and even a fireplace, it will be a hangout that RC has long been missing.

The Academic Center is set to be open by the end of the fall semester in 2004. Until then, the noise of construction, inconvenience of rerouted car and foot pathways, and clouds of dust in the air will be constant reminders that something major is happening out on the RC front lawn—but as anyone here will attest to, the end result will be well worth the wait.

Fall at Rochester College means a couple of distinct things: new faces, new classes, and social clubs! ACADEMIC OFFENNOS: DECINE PROGRAMS IN TECHNICAL AND PROFESSIONAL STUDIES

Rochester College now offers a Bachelor of Science in Technical and Professional Studies. This program allows students combine a technical/professional area of study with either a second professional concentration or with another concentration of study from the liberal arts and sciences (such as Communication, Science, History, English, Music, Religion, or Mathematics). The technical/professional part of the degree can be chosen from the professional options at Rochester College or from a wide selection of technical certificate programs at other local institutions such as Oakland Community College, Macomb Community College, or Specs-Howard School of Broadcasting. Some possible options for certification are Business Multimedia, Culinary Arts, and

Radio and TV Broadcasting (see www.rc.edu for complete list).

This is also a great opportunity for transfer students. Students who have completed a recognized community college degree or a technical certificate program can transfer to Rochester College and apply the credits from those programs toward a four-year Bachelors Degree. This program can help a student develop a wider variety of resources and skills that are valued by employers and that are satisfying to the student's personal goals of achievement and development as well.

involved in RC and enjoy it fully—like I am!



Munich is a visitor-friendly "world city" that welcomes 3.5 million visitors each year, according to its tourism bureau. "Someone with very little knowledge of the German language can effectively live in Munich," said the committee's report." Meanwhile, students will meet people from all over the world."

As far as academic opportunity is concerned, Munich has more libraries than any other city in Germany (183), and many contain English collections. The city also boasts ten universities that enroll nearly 100,000 students. Munich's status as one of Europe's business capitals make it an ideal location for business students to taste the flavor of global commerce. In addition, education students will attain experience in cultural diversity, a requirement for teacher certification in some states.

Rochester College is now in the process of preparing for a trip of this magnitude, by procuring facilities, preparing for classes, and building excitement in the student body. "I'm excited to see the Munich program take off," said 2003 GEO Scotland participant Jamie Litton. "My experience in Scotland showed me the value of international study programs, and I think everyone experience something similar while they're in college."

Hamilton agreed, saying, "Students learn a

lot about the world and other cultures when they travel overseas. In this age, global awareness and understanding are necessary—and not just for being competitive in the job market. If we are to be good stewards of all that we have been blessed with, we must understand who we are and what responsibility we bear globally."
