RC WELCOMES NEW PRESIDENT

(OR AT LEAST GEOLOGICALLY EXPLORED)

There are few circumstances under which a college student would normally be compelled to wake up at 5 a.m. for a science lab. However, Rochester College's Earth Science Field Study is an incomparable exception to that rule. Though the trip's destinations vary year to year, the course is always a two-week geological study in the Western part of the United States. This year, the group explored the natural wonders of Colorado and Utah, traveling to such diverse areas as Pikes Peak, Rocky Mountain National Park, Garden of the Gods and Arches National Park. Here's what student Natalie Redmond had to say about the experience:

"General education courses are typically forgettable; when viewed as mere academic requirements, they can seem time-consuming and pointless. However, seeing them students. Even after my crash course in geology, I am still inclined to classify rocks as "big" or "small" instead of as igneous, sedimentary, or metamorphic, Beyond the bounds of the classroom, however, those details matter much less. In exchange for them, I have the permanent and compelling memories of watching a sunset from the Needles Overlook in Utah's Canyonlands and of whitewater rafting down the Colorado River. A classroom setting, no matter how engaging one finds topical discussions, cannot compete with the experience of exploring subject matter firsthand. Rather than grumbling twice a week at 8 a.m. over having to take an Earth science course, I had the privilege of happily waking up—sometimes before dawn—in order to prepare for that day's hike. Though the academic details will grow fuzzy in time, my appreciation for the natural world will remain ever stronger for having taken this trip. Exploring the terrain firsthand gives one a sense of belonging and understanding that cannot be gathered by textbooks. If nothing but the emotional responses remain in the end, then the class has still done more than its job."

ROCE

However, we also encourage our students to pack up and leave behind the friendly confines of RC to gain authentic alobal awareness through our Global Educational Opportunities program. We believe that as the world shrinks through expanding technology, communications and intercontinental travel. taking time to study in other countries and cultures is an important aspect of post-secondary education. From spending a semester living in Vienna, Austria (when you're not exploring the rest of Europe), to hiking the incredible national parks of the United States, to uncovering ancient artifacts on an archeological dig through Israel, our GEO programs give students perspectives and experiences they never imagined.

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EUROPEAN STUDIES

Each fall, Rochester College partners with Oklahoma Christian University to provide students with the opportunity to study abroad. While based in Vienna, Austria, students are able to visit several countries and experience the excitement and fulfillment of other cultures while they learn. Students are required to enroll in at least 12 hours during this program, completing a full semester of class credit while they are away.

FIELD STUDY

This trip provides an opportunity to fulfill a general education lab/science class requirement in a fun, hands-on manner. Students fly out west, pick up rental vans and supplies and head to their first destination. The trip includes hiking over and through some of the best geology to be found, camping in tents and engaging in education along the way. Students keep journals describing what they see and learn from first-hand observation, trail lectures, interpretive centers, and readings.

EAST AFRICA

While on this trip to Uganda and Rwanda, students will partner with local organizations, such as Kibo Group International, that are helping to provide resources, ideas, and opportunities to local communities. Students may find themselves working alongside counselors, comforting and advising victims of HIV and AIDS, sorting coffee at the Source Café, a redemptive business in Jinja, or planting trees in Busoga with the Kibo Group's Mvule Projects. There will also be time to camp on an island on the Nile River, raft the Nile's Grade 5 rapids and go on safari.

ISRAEL & JORDAN

Students, parents of students, faculty and staff of RC are all welcome to take part in this once-in-a-lifetime trip that includes visits to several biblical destinations, including Jerusalem, the Dead Sea, the Mount of Olives, Capernaum and Jericho. While there, the group spends time hiking and rock climbing during their site tours, taking part in an archeological dig in biblical Tamar, hopping on the back of a camel for an afternoon and generally experiencing the Holy Lands firsthand.

DIVE IN

That's exactly what Allyson did when she came to RC...and it's been quite the experience.

One of the reasons Allyson decided to attend RC was because she was ready to move out of her parent's home after high school, but not quite ready to be far from home. However, Allyson didn't waste any time getting involved in the programs RC offers its students, the GEO program specifically. Soon Allyson found herself quite far from home as she traveled to 23 countries and 6 continents alongside her peers and professors, an aspect of studying abroad that Allyson describes as "one of the best parts."

"GEO trips have connected me in a unique way to the peers and professors who went with me," said Allyson. "I have shared memories with those people that I will never have with anyone else. Professors help open your eyes to the history and culture around you that you might have missed otherwise. For example, our group got a

personal lecture about Paul from one of RC's religion faculty members while sitting in the ancient city Ephesus. I can learn in a classroom, but there are some things that are impossible to gain behind a desk."

Allyson says travel has made her realize how much she doesn't know...and that's a good thing! "Ironically, being aware of how much I don't know has actually made me more

confident. I have learned that I don't have to know everything. I will always be learning."

From history, to language, to how to bargain with aggressive Chinese salespeople in the Silk Market, travel has taught Allyson a great deal. However, she says that traveling has taught her more about herself than anything else. "It has increased my people skills and has made me more comfortable with myself and how I relate

to people even if I don't understand them."

One thing that can be understood despite cultural barriers is pure and simple fun—something Allyson had a lot of during her GEO trips. Then again, it's pretty easy to have fun when you're

skydiving in New Zealand, scuba diving at the Great Barrier Reef, going to a Japanese onsen, staring out at Island in the Sky in Utah, holding a koala bear, standing in front of the terra cotta warriors...
