The City of Northville is a distinctive community of approximately 6500 residents located on the western fringe of the Detroit Metro area. The City was incorporated as a village in 1867 and as a city in 1955. The 2.2 square mile area is equally divided between Wayne and Oakland Counties and is about 30 minutes from downtown Detroit and 25 minutes from downtown Ann Arbor. The major thoroughfares of I-275 and M-14 are nearby. The Northville area is known for its rolling hills and attractive countryside. The City retains a small-town atmosphere with stately Victorian-era architecture in its Historic District and well-kept older homes built before the 1930s. Fully developed in the 1950s, Pontiac is redeveloping its downtown and industrial areas. New commercial and office developments are leading the way in the reuse of available land. Pontiac is a full service community with a full menu of available housing. The city strives to provide quality services to meet the needs of its residents, visitors, and businesses. A forward-looking city that is proud of its accomplishments. Pontiac has the distinction of being the first prominent settlement in the interior of Michigan. The first settlers, according to the best authenticated records, were Colonel Stephen Mack, Major Joseph Todd, William Lester and Orison Allen. These, with a body of workmen, probably came in November or December of 1818. Colonel Stephen Mack was the leading stockholder in the 'Pontiac Company' and so founded the name Pontiac.


The City of Rochester, dating from the 1850s, is a vibrant small town 3.8 square miles in size. It became a village in 1869 and was incorporated as a city in 1967.. Most of the original buildings comprising downtown are still in use, some registered as Michigan Historic Sites. Parks, walking trails and tree-lined streets in neighborhoods with modest homes give the city much of its charm. Paint Creek and the Clinton River flow though the city and the municipal park provides a people focus for the City of Rochester. The city is governed by an elected, seven-member city council and headed by an appointed city manager. Rochester provides full city services including police, fire and water/sewer services. The Leader Dogs for the Blind staff can frequently be seen on the streets with dogs in training. September attracts thousands for the Art & Apples Festival. In December, shoppers descend on downtown for the annual Lagniappe night, where shoppers receive a small gift as a "thank you" for their patronage of local shops.

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Abstract

This report documents new residential construction, including manufactured housing, occurring in each county and community in Southeast Michigan in 2002. It also provides a comparison analysis with previous years.

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SEMCOG

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This report was prepared by Janet Mocadlo. Muhammad El-Mubarak was the primary staff on this project and performed the monthly data collection.

Definitions

Authorized Housing Unit - A residential housing unit that has been issued an official permit from a community to begin construction.

Single-Family - A free standing, detached building with only one housing unit. Includes single-family homes, detached condominiums, and manufactured homes not located within a manufactured housing park.

Two-Family - A duplex, two-family flat, or condo with two units per structure and not considered to be a townhouse or attached condominium.

Townhouses/Attached Condos - Townhouses or condominiums that are attached but each unit is separated by a wall that extends from ground to roof; none of the units are above or below each other and each unit has a separate heating system, utility meter, and direct outside entrance. These housing units are grouped with the multi-family numbers in the report.

Multi-Family - A residential building that contains three or more housing units, not considered to be a townhouse or attached condo, and usually has one entrance from the outside and a common hall (e.g., an apartment building).

Manufactured Homes - Corresponds to the number of new licensed sites within manufactured housing parks. Manufactured housing parks are licensed by the State of Michigan for a specific number of sites or pads. There may or may not be an actual manufactured home on the site at the time of this publication.

Demolition - A housing unit that is either demolished by wrecking (an official demolition permit is issued in this case), destroyed by fire, or destroyed by an act of nature.

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
Region experiences an eight percent growth in new housing in 2002, gains made across the board

The Southeast Michigan region enjoyed an eight percent increase in new residential construction in 2002, with 21,742 units permitted overall. This is 1,552 more units than were permitted in 2001. Record low interest rates were the main factor for the positive growth. Single-family construction grew two percent (291 units), with 14,726 permits issued. Two-family construction contributed 534 new units — a 56 percent increase from 2001. Multi-family units recorded a 20 percent increase, with 6,482 construction permits issued. Oakland County permitted the most new residential housing permits with 5,362 units, followed closely by Macomb County with 5,123 units. Wayne County came in third with 4,776 units permitted. Macomb and Monroe counties experienced the largest percent change increase in units, with 16 and 11 respectively. Wayne County grew seven percent, Livingston, Oakland, and St. Clair had gains between four and five percent, and Washtenaw County had a three percent increase in new units authorized. New licensed manufactured housing units in parks added another 1,590 units to the region's housing stock, bringing the total number of new residential units to 23,332. By structure type, single-family units accounted for 63 percent of all new units, multi-family for 28 percent, manufactured housing units for six percent, and two-family structures for two percent of the total.

Highlights from 2002:

- Macomb (1,572 units), and Canton (1,143 units) townships were the top two communities in the region for total units authorized for the sixth consecutive year.
- Oakland Township made its first showing on the top 10 list, with 596 new units authorized in 2002 seventh for the year.
- Novi (648 units), Canton Township (491 units), and the City of Detroit (389 units) were the top three communities in new authorized two-family and multi-family housing units.
- The City of Detroit, absent from the top 10 list since 1999, came back in eighth place with 569 new units authorized. It also accounted for 70 percent (2,578 units) of the demolitions in the region.
- In new manufactured housing units in parks, Augusta Township in Washtenaw County and Chesterfield Township in Macomb County topped the list with 228 and 214 new licensed sites, respectively.

Figure 2 **Single-Family Units, 2002**




Figure 3 **Two-Family and Multi-Family Units, 2002**







2030 RDF Executive Summary

SEMCOG has produced an update of its long range forecast of population, households, and jobs for the Southeast Michigan region, for 233 communities, and for 1,442 subcommunity area. The 2030 Regional Development Forecast (RDF) provides numbers at five-year intervals from 1990 to future year 2030. The 2030 RDF will provide the base data for the update of SEMCOG's Regional Transportation Plan and other regional planning. It provides a comprehensive view of future changes for use by SEMCOG's members in planning for infrastructure and other needs.

Using a three-step process, the 2030 RDF takes advantage of all available data inputs: the most recent data from Census 2000, data on jobs from the state employment agency, updates of land availability and planned uses, and local officials' expectations about near-term development and future sewering. After starting with a national econometric model to gauge the total region's future, the RDF uses a second computer model to forecast the future of 247 districts within the seven-county region, and finally uses trends and land availability in a third step to allocate district forecasts to 1,442 traffic analysis zones.

The region's overall forecast is one of steady, moderate growth from 2000-2030. Population will grow 12 percent to 5.4 million by 2030. Households will increase twice as fast, 21 percent over 30 years, as the average number of persons per household declines and all the increase in households will be in households without children. The aging of the baby boom generation (which will be 75 or older in 2030), as well as longer life spans, mean that 37 percent of all households will be elderly in 2030 (that is, these households will have at least one person 65 or older). Job growth will not be as robust as in the 1990s, but will increase 16 percent 2000-2030. However, future job growth depends on many more older people staying in the labor force, with many in part-time jobs.

At the community level, Southeast Michigan will grow most strongly at the edges of the urban area, where land is available and jobs are within commuting distance. Household growth will be strongest in western Wayne County, the Ann Arbor area, southeast Livingston County, western and northern Oakland County, and central Macomb County. Population



growth will follow the same general pattern, of course. However, because of fewer persons per household and relatively modest amounts of new housing construction, the mature suburbs of Detroit will lose population. Detroit's historic rates of household and population loss have slowed considerably and this will continue.

The pattern of job growth will be generally similar to households, although not as spread out to the west and north. Job growth will be concentrated in fewer suburban communities, reflecting the stronger role of transportation access and central location for jobs. Areas of the City of Detroit with job losses will be increasingly balanced by areas of job growth, resulting in near stability for city job numbers post-2020.


