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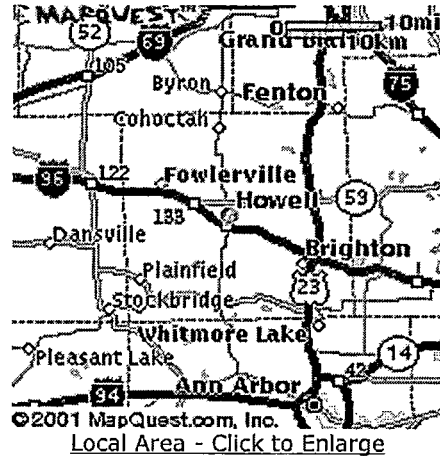
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Livingston County

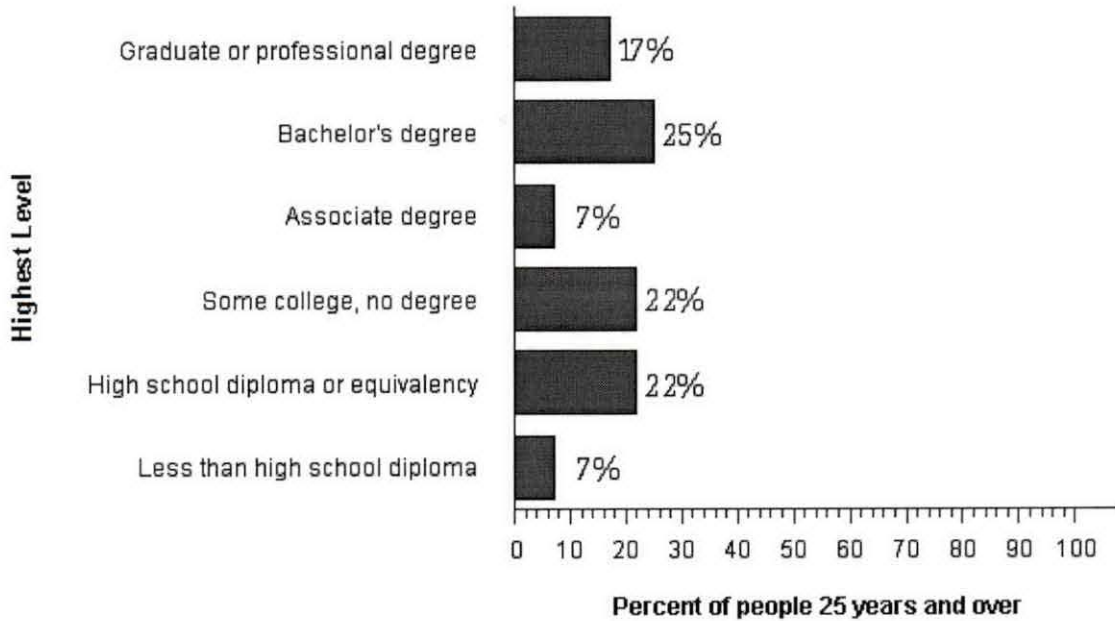

The Educational Attainment of People in Oakland County, Michigan in 2003

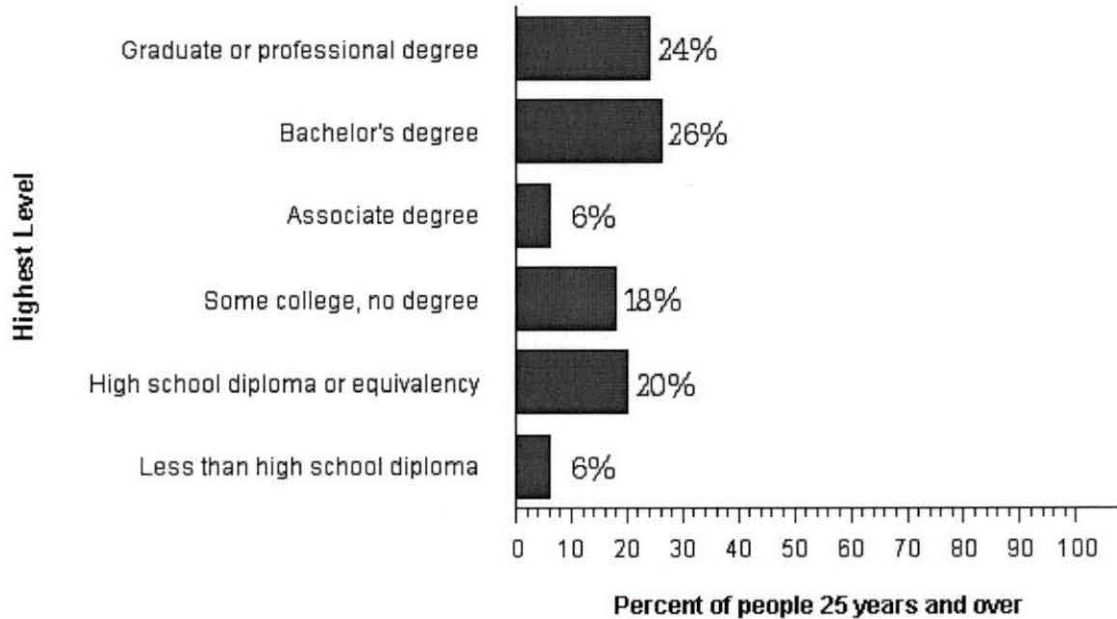

The Educational Attainment of People in Washtenaw County, Michigan in 2003

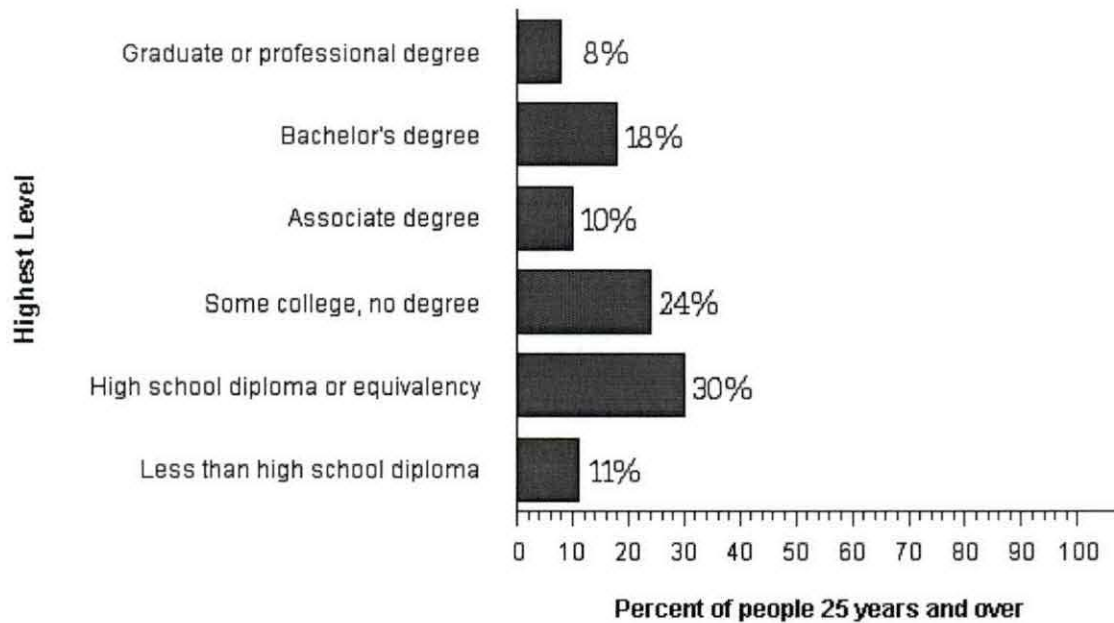

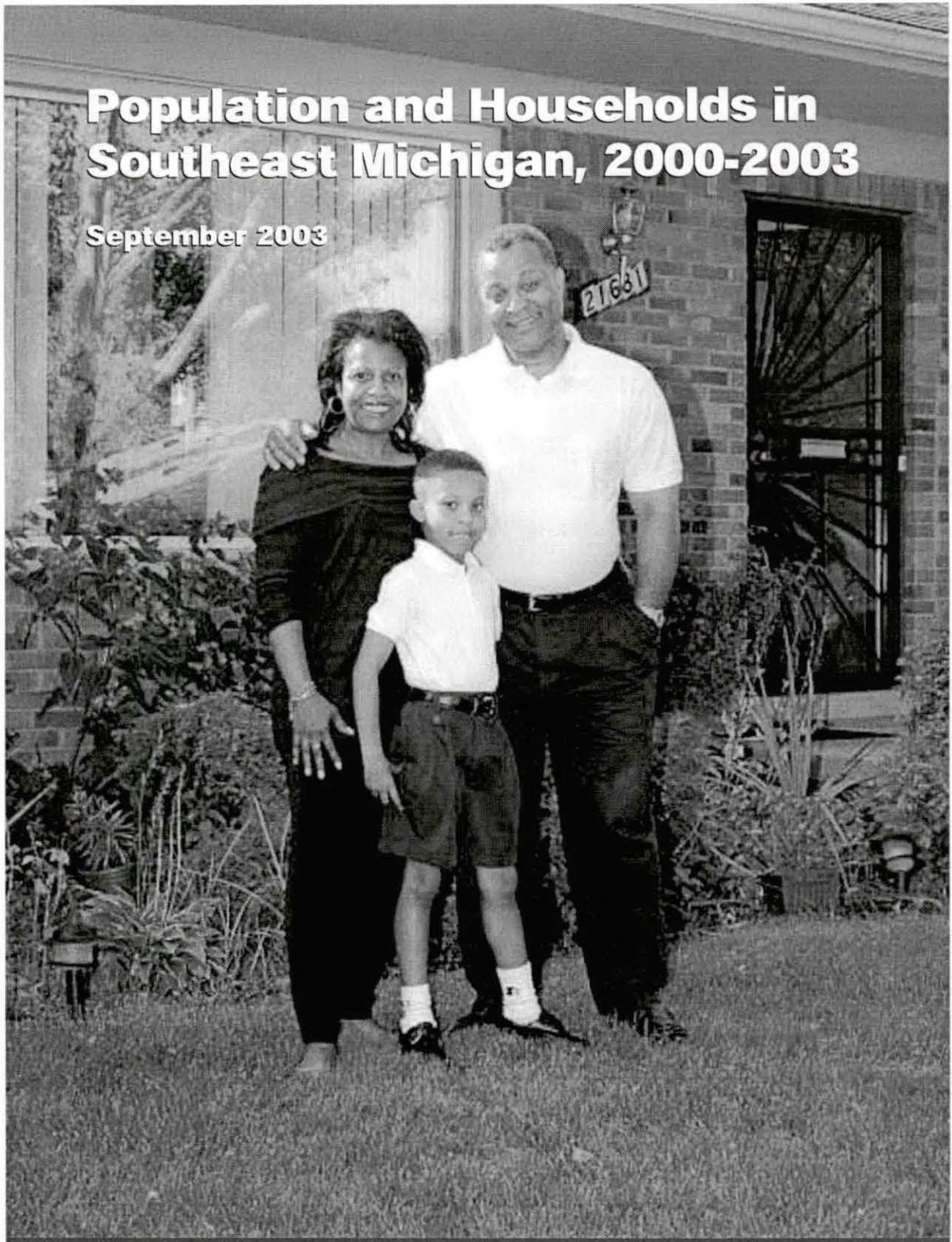

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Mission

SEMCOG's mission is solving regional planning problems — improving the efficiency and effectiveness of the region's local governments as well as the quality of life in Southeast Michigan. Essential functions are:

Policy decision making

All SEMCOG policy decisions are made by local elected officials, ensuring that regional policies reflect the interests of member communities. Participants serve on one or both of the policymaking bodies — the General Assembly and the Executive Committee.

Prior to policy adoption, technical advisory councils provide the structure for gaining input on transportation, environment, community and economic development, data analysis, and education. This deliberative process includes broad-based representation from local governments, the business community, environmental organizations, and other special interest citizen groups.

Population and Households in Southeast Michigan, 2000-2003

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Abstract

This report contains data and discussion of recent population and household changes in Southeast Michigan. A table lists population and household estimates for every county and community in the seven-county region for the 2000 Census and July 2003. Additional tables and figures further depict general trends in the three factors that affect the region's population – births, deaths, and migration.

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Regional Summary 2000-2003: Population and Households Grow Steadily

According to SEMCOG estimates, the number of persons and households in Southeast Michigan has been growing at a steady rate since the April 2000 Census. The region gained approximately 90,000 persons and 50,000 households from April 2000 to July 2003. Total population increased by 1.8 percent and households by 2.6 percent during this time period. The region is estimated to have a population of 4,920,000 and 1,890,000 households in 2003.

As shown in Table 1, all counties in Southeast Michigan, except for Wayne County, experienced population and household growth since the last census. Although Wayne County now has 10,000 fewer persons and 1,000 fewer households, in percentage terms the county's population and number of households is fairly stable, falling only 0.5 percent and 0.1 percent, respectively. **At the other end of the spectrum, Livingston County's population grew 11 percent, with households increasing 13 percent.** The county gaining the greatest number of persons and households from 2000-2003 is Macomb County with 33,000 more persons and 16,000 more households.

The region's average number of persons per household, or household size, decreased from 2.66 in 1990 to 2.58 in 2000. The decline in household size is continued and estimated to be 2.56 for the region in 2003. Total population estimates include persons residing in households and group quarters (e.g., correctional facilities, dormitories, and nursing homes). The region's group quarters population is estimated at 82,000 in 2003 and accounts for two percent of the region's total population.

Changes in population and households at the community level are found in Table 2. In absolute terms, Macomb Township exceeds all other Southeast Michigan communities in both population and household gain. With an increase of 14,000 persons and 5,000 households since the 2000 Census, Macomb Township accounts for 16 percent of population growth in Southeast Michigan and 10 percent of the region's additional households. Other communities with population growth averaging more than 1,000 persons per year since 2000 include Brownstown Township, Canton Township, Chesterfield Township, Genoa Township, Northville Township, Shelby Township, and Ypsilanti Township. In percentage terms, the communities of Dexter, Marion Township, New Baltimore, and New Haven have increased their population by more than 30 percent since 2000. Figures 1 and 2 geographically depict population and household change from April 2000 to July 2003 for all communities in the region.

The 20 largest communities in Southeast Michigan in terms of population in 2003 are listed in Table 3. With Macomb Township's population increase of 14,000 since the last census, the community moves up four spots from its previous ranking and now ranks as the 19th most populous community in the region. Other communities moving up in the list include Canton Township, Shelby Township, and West Bloomfield Township.

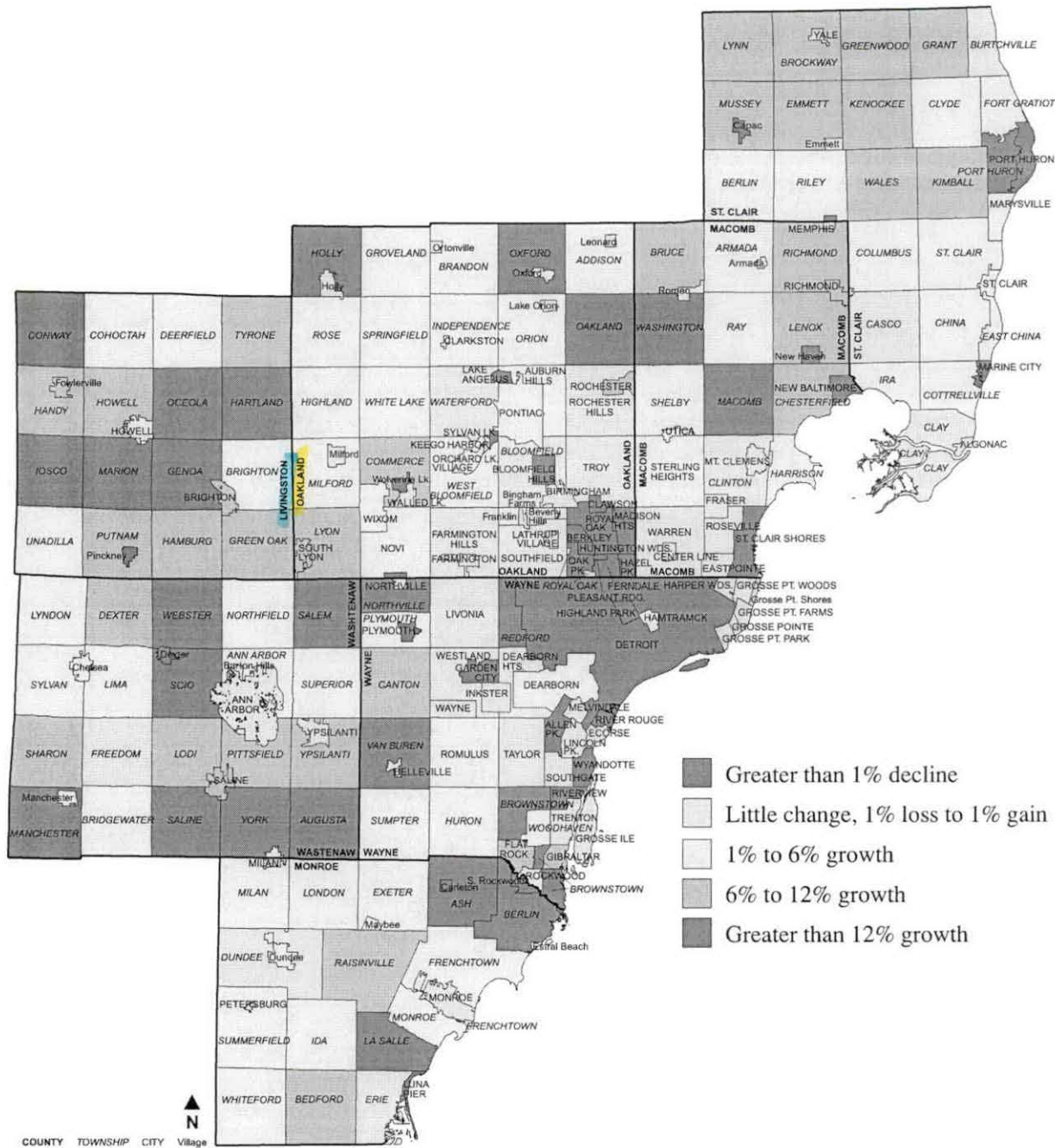

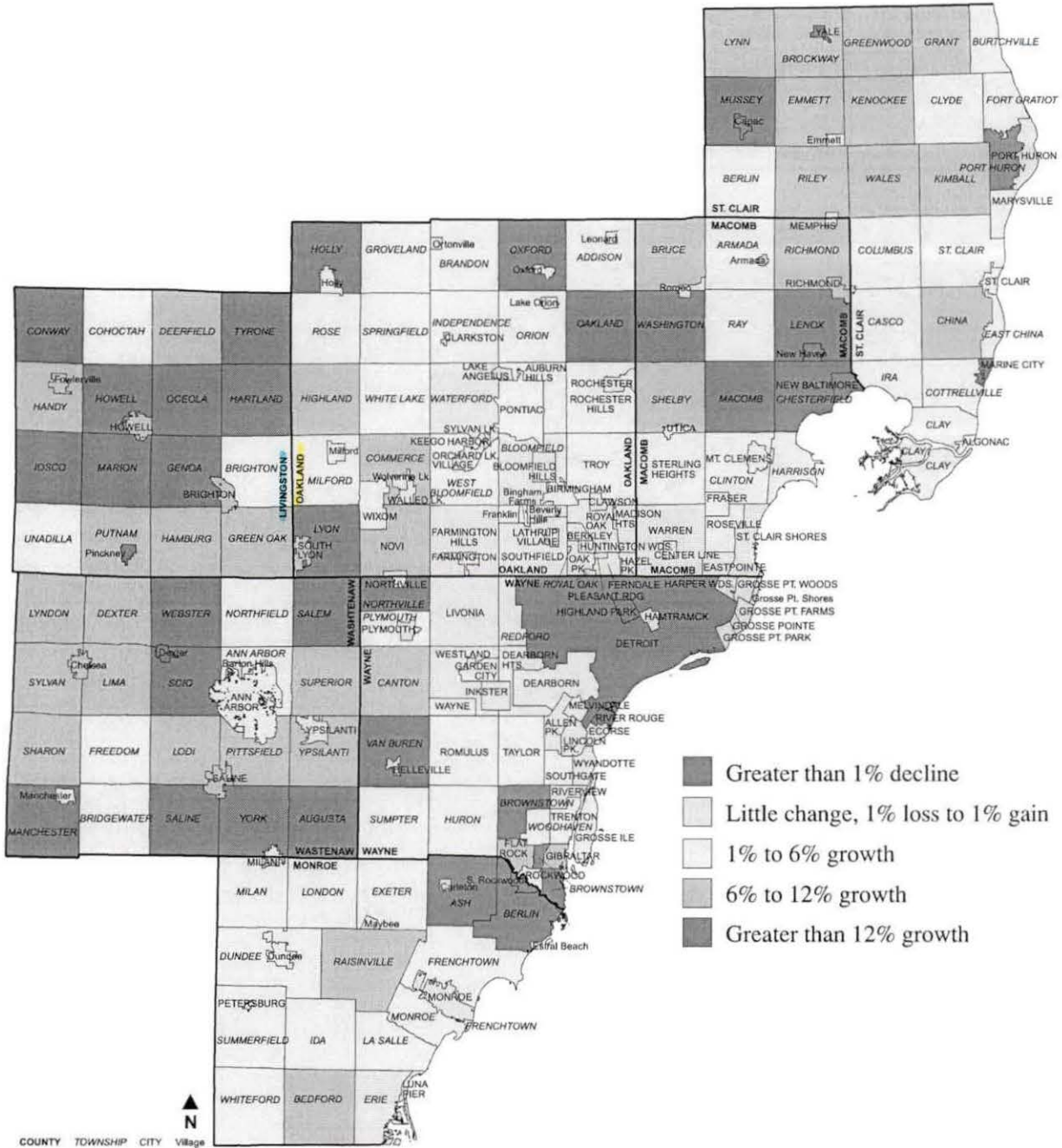

Components of Population Change

The three factors affecting population of an area are births, deaths, and the movement of people (migration). As shown in Figure 3, Southeast Michigan continues to experience more births than deaths, which results in a natural increase in population. The trend of births over the past decade is decreasing, while the trend in deaths is stable-to-slightly-increasing. The region's birth rate in 1990 was 16.9 per 1,000 persons compared to 13.7 in 2001. The death rate for the region was 8.6 per 1,000 persons in 1990 and 2001. The birth and death rates for the U.S. in 2001 were 14.1 and 8.5, respectively. Since the rate of natural increase is the birth rate minus the death rate, the region's rate of natural increase in 2001 is 5.1 compared to 5.6 for the nation. Therefore, in regards to natural increase, the region is growing at a slower rate than the nation. As shown in Table 4, the rates of natural increase for Livingston, Oakland, and Washtenaw Counties were greater than the nation's rate in 2001.

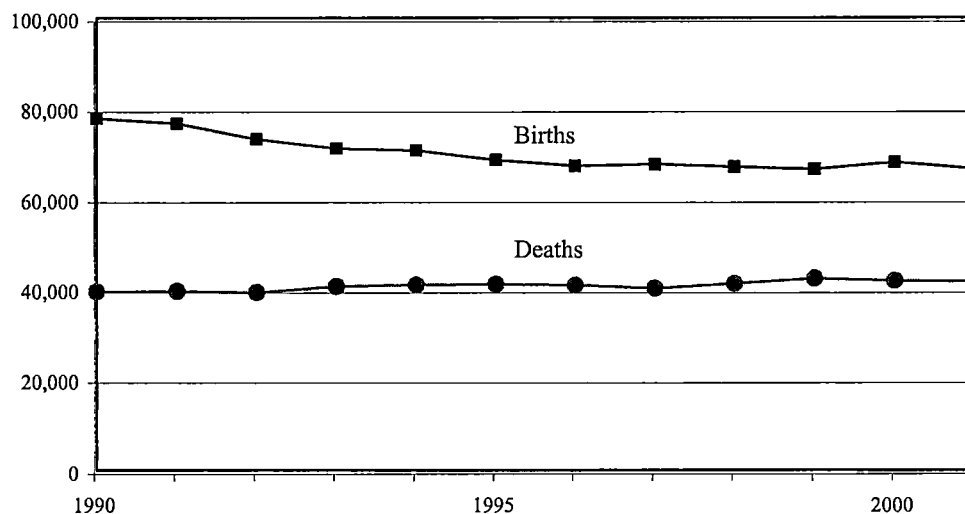
Population is also affected by people moving into an area (in-migration) and out of an area (out-migration). Net migration is the net effect of people moving in and out of an area over a period of time. If in-migration is greater than out-migration (more persons moved into an area than moved out), then net in-migration occurs. On the other hand, if out-migration surpasses in-migration, the result is net out-migration. The combination of net migration and natural increase determines the overall population change in an area over time.

According to the Census Bureau's 1995-2000 state-to-state migration data, Michigan gained small numbers of people from nearby states such as Ohio and Illinois, but lost large numbers to Florida, Arizona, Georgia, Tennessee, and North Carolina. Michigan's domestic out-migration is largely attributed to the movement of college/young adult age groups (15-29 years of age) and persons in their retirement years (50 and older) out of state. Michigan's rate of net domestic out-migration from 1995-2000 was similar to those of other states in the Midwest.

Table 5 shows the components of population change for Southeast Michigan estimated for 2000-2002. Given that the region experienced an average annual net out-migration of 6,000 from 1990-2000 (*Population and Households in Southeast Michigan, 2000-2002*), the table shows that the region continues to experience net out-migration at a similar rate. At the county level, however, all counties except Oakland and Wayne Counties had more people moving into the county from 2000-2002 than there were moving out. The net in-migration of these counties also had a greater effect on population change than did natural increase. County net migration from 2000-2001 and from 2001-2002 remained fairly constant with the exception of Oakland County whose net out-migration nearly tripled.

The Census Bureau recently released 1995-2000 county-to-county migration data. Using this dataset, one can begin to quantify and visualize the flow of domestic migration between U.S. counties. The region's domestic migration within and out of Southeast Michigan is found in Table 6. The table shows the number of persons, age five or older, moving to a different county during the five-year time period. The net exchange of domestic migration is the difference between the numbers of persons moving from one place to another in opposing directions. Figure 4 displays the net exchange of domestic migration between counties in Southeast Michigan and outside of the region. The region's net flow of domestic migration from 1995-2000 is generally outward from Wayne County. The largest flows were from Wayne County to Oakland and Macomb Counties, and from Wayne, Oakland, and Macomb Counties to outside the region.

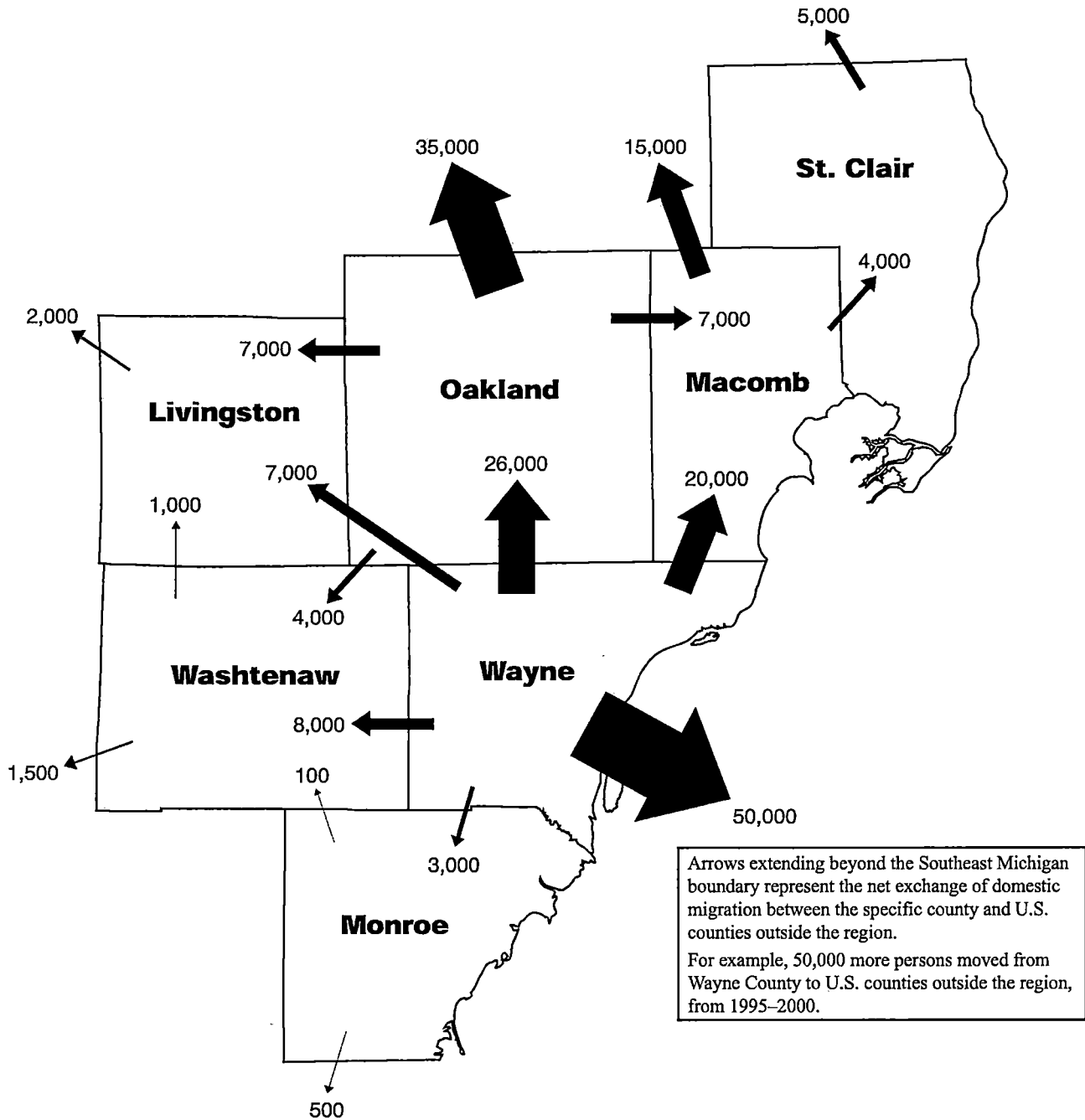

Methodology of Estimates: The Housing Unit Method

Population of a community would best be estimated by applying migration and vital statistics data to a reliable population base number. The obvious choice for the most recent base number is Census 2000 total population. Although birth and death information is routinely captured and fairly accurate, a readily accessible source for migration data at the community level has not yet been identified.

The Census Bureau generates annual county population estimates using vital statistics and migration data and controls them to national totals. Since there does not exist reliable migration data for communities, the Census Bureau produces annual sub-county (community) population estimates using the housing unit method and controls them to the published county totals.

The Census Bureau's housing unit method utilizes building permits to update Census 2000 housing unit counts. Housing loss is estimated using historical housing inventory data and surveys. For each community, Census 2000 occupancy rates are applied to the updated number of housing units to estimate the number of occupied housing units (households). Next, the number of persons per household can also be determined from the latest census data and when applied to the number of households, the household population can be estimated. The household population is then controlled to the Census Bureau's most recently released household population at the county level. This step is accomplished by proportionally distributing the difference between the sum of the communities' estimates and the county estimate to each community household population in the county. Finally, any changes in the group quarters population are used to update the Census 2000 group quarters population and are added to the community's household population to result in total population.

Similar to the Census Bureau's estimates methodology, SEMCOG also relies on the housing unit method to produce community population estimates that are controlled to the Census Bureau's latest county estimates. The two housing unit methods are comparable with the following exceptions:

- For select cities and villages surrounded by a single township or multiple townships, the Census Bureau reports the population as part of the surrounding township(s). SEMCOG, on the other hand, provides estimates for each city, village, and township in the region.
- SEMCOG utilizes its regional building permit and demolitions database and does not estimate housing loss based on historical data.
- The Census Bureau applies a two-percent reduction factor to building permits. SEMCOG does not.
- The Census Bureau applies a six-month lag time to all building permit data for estimating completed construction and occupancy. SEMCOG applies an eight-month lag time to multi-family building permits and a six-month lag time for all other permits.
- The Census Bureau derives estimates for new mobile homes using state mobile home shipment data, whereas SEMCOG uses its regional manufactured home database. The database contains information obtained from the Manufactured Housing and Land Development Division of the State of Michigan.
- Instead of using Census 2000 household sizes, SEMCOG extrapolates the change in household size from 1990-2000 to the current month.

- SEMCOG applies household sizes and occupancy rates by household type (i.e., single-family, two-family, multi-family, manufactured/mobile home, and other). The Census Bureau uses one household size and occupancy rate per community.
- When controlling community household population to the latest Census Bureau county totals, SEMCOG keeps its housing unit counts and estimated household sizes constant and adjusts occupancy rates. Also, SEMCOG separates the City of Detroit from the rest of Wayne County and applies Detroit's implied 1990-2000 migration data from census data when controlling to Wayne County's household population.
- Lastly, SEMCOG provides current monthly population and household estimates for communities, whereas the Census Bureau only provides annual population estimates.
